# Biographical Note by The HistoryMakers®

Linda Washington Cropp was born on October 5, 1947, in Atlanta, Georgia. Her parents divorced when she was three years old, and she relocated to Philadelphia with her mother. As a single parent, her mother worked two jobs to support the family and send Cropp to Catholic school. Cropp earned her high school diploma in 1965 from Little Flower Catholic High School for Girls where she was active in student government and band. As a teenager, Cropp enjoyed photography and sewing, was a member of Girl Scouts of America.

In 1969, Cropp earned her B.A. degree in government from Howard University. During her senior year, she interned with the Washington, D.C., Board of Elections and Ethics. Shortly after graduation, she worked on her first political campaign, helping Marion Barry win a seat on the District of Columbia Board of Education.

Cropp began her teaching career in Washington, D.C., public schools in 1970. She earned her M.S. degree in guidance and counseling from Howard University in 1971. In 1980, she was elected to her first public office on the city's Board of Education. In 1990, Cropp successfully ran against former Washington, D.C., Mayor Marion Barry for an at-large seat on the Council of the District of Columbia. In 1997, Cropp was elected as the first woman to chair the city council. Under her leadership, she has improved the Council's use of technology and provided citizens greater access to the legislative process. In 2006, Adrian Fenty beat her out in the Democratic Primary for Mayor.

Cropp and her husband, Dwight, reside in Washington, D.C., and have two adult children.

## **Series I: Original Interview Footage**

Linda Cropp discusses her parents' family backgrounds, sharing stories about her paternal and maternal grandparents. She details her childhood trips to Atlanta to visit her extended family after her parent's divorce. Cropp then talks about what it was like being raised in a single-parent household. Lastly, Cropp describes her neighborhood surroundings growing up in Philadelphia in the 1950s.

Video Oral History Interview with Linda Cropp, Section A2005 013 001 002, TRT: 0:31:24?

Linda Cropp recalls her education in Philadelphia's Catholic school system. Cropp then discusses the influence Girl Scouts had on her maturation process, particularly in her motivation to do volunteer work. She then describes her high school experiences, talking about her academic success, student leadership roles, and extracurricular activities. Lastly, Cropp talks about a childhood encounter with racism while on a road trip to the South with her mother, an event which raised her racial and political awareness.

Video Oral History Interview with Linda Cropp, Section A2005 013 001 003, TRT: 0:29:22?

Linda Cropp discusses the culture shock she experienced coming from a strict Catholic school environment to Howard University's system in the mid-1960s, during a time when the campus was known for its activism. She explains how she integrated herself into the activist culture. Cropp then talks about the District of Columbia's local political system and how it differs from other cities in the U.S. She then briefly details her husband's career in teaching and politics. Cropp talks about her career in education after graduating from Howard as a teacher, guidance counselor and school board member. Cropp finally discusses her foray into D.C. politics with her 1991 election to the city council.

Video Oral History Interview with Linda Cropp, Section A2005 013 001 004, TRT: 0:30:24?

Linda Cropp talks about her political campaign against Marion Barry for a seat in Washington D.C.'s City Council in 1990, and becoming the first woman to chair the City Council. Cropp comments on gentrification in Washington and the effects the U.S. Congress has on the inner workings of the city. She then talks about the greatest challenge in her political career, opposing Major League Baseball's efforts to move a team to Washington. Lastly, Cropp comments on her legacy and how she would like to be remembered.
