# **Biographical Note by The HistoryMakers®**

Non-profit education executive, television personality and radio producer Sylvia Michelle Ewing was born in Erie, Pennsylvania on March 21, 1957 to Linwood Anthony Dennard a gospel music producer, and Louise Miller, a homemaker. She was raised by Louise Miller and her step father Milton Miller. She graduated from Technical Memorial Vocational High School in 1975.

Ewing came to Chicago, Illinois in 1977 and co-founded *City Life*, a free magazine for African Americans. During the 80s, she was active in the Anti-apartheid movement in Chicago and worked for the Mozambique Support Network In 1991, she became host of the "On-Target" radio series on Chicago's WVON-AM. Since 1994, Ewing has worked as an on-air host for Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) Chicago affiliate WTTW's pledge drive segments, and has done voice-overs for the station's programs and special projects. In 1999, she became a producer for WTTW's television program *Chicago Tonight* and served as producer for the Chicago Public Radio's WBEZ program Eight Forty-Eight from 2004 to 2006 and director of cultural relations of Steppenwolf Theater Company's Traffic Series for the 2007 - 2008 season. In 2008, she served as the Deputy Director and in 2010, became the Director of External Affairs for the Illinois Network of Charter Schools. Ewing also teaches media literacy and journalism classes as an adjunct professor at Columbia College Chicago and has written for *Chicago Parent* Magazine, the *Chicago Sun-Times* and *N'DIGO* Magazine.

Ewing has received the Award of Excellence from the Chicago Association of Black Journalists, the Peter Lisagor Award, the Edward R. Murrow Award, the Public News Directors, Inc. Award and has been nominated for three local Emmys. She has served on the board of directors for several organizations including the Association of Women Journalists, the Illinois College Access Network, and the Chicago Committee for Urban Opportunity and the Community Justice for Youth Institute. Ewing was the president of the Young Chicago Authors Board of Directors home of the Louder than a Bomb youth poetry festival and the co-creator of the concept for the Right to Succeed education organization. She is a certified meditation teacher and has practiced yoga since she was

nineteen. Ewing lives in Chicago, Illinois and has two adult children Eve and Matthew.

### **Series I: Original Interview Footage**

Sylvia Ewing describes her family's history. Her mother, Louise Miller, was born in January of 1938 in Houston, Mississippi, and then moved with her family to Erie, Pennsylvania at the age of nine, where they settled. Ewing was raised by her mother, grandmother, Rosa Anne Thomas, and her stepfather, Milton Miller. She talks about meeting her biological father, Lynwood Anthony Dennard, for the first time when she was nineteen years old, her relationship with him, his career as an entrepreneur and a record producer, and his family in California. Ewing recalls her mother and stepfather's courtship, and her stepfather's dedication towards their family. She also reflects upon the influence that her parents and her stepfather have had in her life. Ewing discusses the neighborhood where she grew up in Erie, her siblings, and her earliest childhood memories.

Sylvia Ewing was born and raised in Erie, Pennsylvania. She describes the city, her memories of growing up there, and her experience in elementary and middle school. Ewing attended Technical Memorial Vocational High School, where she became interested in art, dance, production and marketing, and commercial art. She talks about her classes, extracurricular activities in high school, and graduating in 1975. Ewing also discusses her relationship with her younger sisters, Nicole and Colette.

Sylvia Ewing graduated from Technical Memorial Vocational High School in Erie, Pennsylvania, in 1979, where she studied commercial art. She then spent a year in Florida before returning to Erie. In 1977, Ewing moved to Chicago, Illinois, to study dance. She also worked as a receptionist at the management consulting firm, Amerherst Associates. Ewing co-founded a free periodical called 'City Life' in the late 1970s, and then founded Chicago Fashion Associates to mentor youth. She describes her experience with 'City Life' and Chicago Fashion Associates, as well as her involvement in the anti-Apartheid movement and the Mozambique Support Network. Ewing also describes her interest in television and the news, Dr. Martin Luther King's assassination, learning about Malcolm X, and her views on religion and spirituality.

Sylvia Ewing was hired to work at WVON Radio, an African American station in Chicago, Illinois, in 1991. In 1994, she joined WTTW, Channel 11 as an onair pledge talent, and went on to host and produce her own shows. Ewing describes her experience at WVON and at WTTW. She further describes her involvement in the Mozambique Support Network, and her experience organizing a conference on Namibia in Chicago in the 1980s. Ewing talks about her former husband, his career, their two children and working freelance. She also recalls Oprah Winfrey's early days in Chicago.

Ewing talks about her transition from mainstream media to education, when she joined the Illinois Network of Charter Schools. In 2007, she began working for 'Traffic' at Steppenwolf Theatre Company, and returned to INCS in 2008. Ewing describes her experience at Steppenwolf Theatre. She also talks about her work in broadcast media that led to the Peter Lisagor Award for Broadcast Journalism and the Edward R. Murrow Award.
